# STAAR Performance Descriptors

**MASTERS:** Students are expected to succeed in the next grade level with little or no academic intervention.

**MEETS:** Students have a high likelihood of success in the next grade level but may require some short-term, targeted academic interventions.



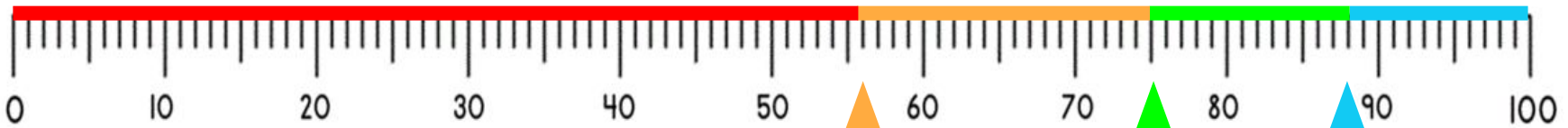
# STAAR Performance Descriptors

**APPROACHES:** Students are likely to succeed in the next grade level with targeted academic intervention.

**DID NOT MEET GRADE LEVEL:** Students are unlikely to succeed in the next grade level without significant, ongoing academic intervention. Students do not demonstrate a sufficient understanding of the knowledge and skills.

# WHY READ 20 MINUTES AT HOME?

| Student A Reads   | Student B Reads   | Student C Reads   |

If they start reading for 20 minutes per night in Kindergarten, by the end of 6<sup>th</sup> grade, Student A will have read for the equivalent of 60 school days, Student B will have read for 12 school days, and Student C will have read for 3.

# MY TEXAS PUBLIC SCHOOL

- Compulsory attendance letters are sent out when a student has 10 or more unexcused absences. Absences include “days” and “parts of days.”
- Attendance Meetings are scheduled with the Principal, and Truancy Prevention Measures are discussed.
- Parents may be charged or fined if their child continues to miss school.
- Students must be present 90% of days to be promoted to the next grade level.



# Communicating at Home

**Tired of getting one-word answers from your kids about their day? Try this fun activity!**

- 1. Cut strips or pieces of paper.**
- 2. Write down a variety of questions - 1 question per paper/slip.**
- 3. Place the questions into a baggie or envelope.**
- 4. Randomly draw one, and let the conversation begin!**

**Try picking a few to discuss on car rides, over dinner, or each evening before bedtime. You'll definitely learn something new!**





# Examples of Conversation Starters

1. What was the best part of your day?
2. What was the worst part of your day?
3. What makes a good friend?
4. If you could have any superpower in the world, what would it be and why?
5. What's something you're really good at?
6. Describe yourself using 3 words.
7. If you could travel anywhere in the world, where would you go?
8. If you had a million dollars, what would you spend it on?
9. What's your favorite season? Why?
10. If you could only keep one of your toys, what would it be?



# Preventing "Summer Slide"

“Summer Slide” is the tendency for kids to forget reading and other skills they learned in school during the summer. **Children can lose a whole grade-level's worth of skills in the summer**, requiring them to put in extra time in the fall to catch up with their peers at school!



# What can parents do about it?

**Keep your children engaged in learning, and get them involved in educational programs and activities during the summer months.**

- **Have your children make a summer reading pledge through the Scholastic Summer Reading Program.**
- **Research shows that reading just six books during the summer may keep a struggling reader from regressing. When choosing the six, be sure that they are just right — not too hard and not too easy. Take advantage of the Blessing Library. Ask for help selecting books that match your child's age, interests, and abilities.**

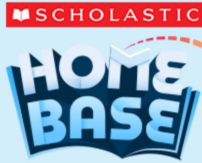

By keeping reading streaks in *Home Base*, kids will unlock a donation of 100,000 books from Scholastic to Save the Children for kids in rural America with limited or no access to books.



# What else can parents do about it?

- Get your child to take the Summer Math Challenge from MetaMetrics. You'll get daily emails with fun math activities and resources.

- Journaling can be a useful way for kids to practice writing.
- Look into your local youth-serving organizations such as 4-H or Scouts.
